





Undoubtedly one of the events which Howard has been most glad to be associated with in a very crowded six months has been a joint venture which has successfully linked WAR ON WANT, JUST SEVENTEEN magazine, about 150 schools and the desperately needy people in Eritrea, E. Africa.

The idea was David Hepworth's whose magazine had run an

article on Feeding the World in Jan. 85, and who wanted someone from the pop world who would collaborate to raise money specifically among young people at school; he has said that he could think of no one better suited nor more likely to agree to this plan than Howard. He approached him during his TV Whistle Test programme, and in February the appeal had been

The prizes were to be free live concerts given by Howard at the two winning schools - the one that had collected the most money, and the one that had raised money in the most imaginative way.

If there was anything else memorable for a lot of young people about the summer term this year (apart from exams and the appalling weather) it's likely to be the fun they had during that time thinking up and acting out devious schemes for getting money out of teachers, friends and others (!) - with the great excuse, that it was All in A Good Cause.

Energy went into meeting the appeal in all kinds of ways...
THE SHEER PHYSICAL EFFORT of an 80-mile BED PUSH from
Tamworth in Staffs by WOODHOUSE HIGH to Howard's Management Offices in Aylesbury (despite distinct lack of imaginative help from Police and local authorities in advance, and threats to prosecute on the way), and of a marathon 100-HOUR trampolining which put a feam of under 16's from ICKNIELD SCHOOL into the record books and raised £721.19 in doing so.

THE SHEER NERVE that it took to get BROWNHILLS HIGH teachers to have their beards shaved off in the Hall, or give

classes all day in outrageous fancy dress or worse...
AND the quiet creative effort that went into countless paintings and drawings, songs and poems that were to be put up for sale.


The money was specifically not for famine relief as such, but to go towards a public health care programme for the Barka and Sahel regions of Eritrea which aims to help ensure that the people in this part of Africa will be better able themselves to fight the consequences of flood, drought and famine.

6) Production of Health Education materials.

The list of money-raising ideas from one school alone (GLEN EYRE SEC) is mind-boggling:

arm-wrestling, polo-sucking, opposite-hand writing, chair-stack-

ing, blowing up balloons, popping balloons, talking, not talking, joining can ring-pulls, kissing, staring, laughing...
By a combination of generosity, enthusiasm and organisation, it was MYERS CROFT COMPREHENSIVE which collected the most, in a great variety of ways, and to add to their magnificent total of £6,375 (plus another £30.38 at the last minute) they have said they will donate a further 50p a head to attend the concert itself...



And the Assembly Hall concert prize for the most imaginative entry went to HENRY BEAUFORT SCHOOL who set out to achieve a scheme which would not only raise money at the time, but also provide a permanent reminder of the purpose of it all – the situation in Eritrea.

Two fifth form girls (Karen Murphy and Kate Burrett) were responsible for the original concept and its sympathetic treatment. The result was this canvas some 10 feet by 6 feet, painted by nominated members of tutor groups from each year in the school, and which now hangs in the Concert Hall there.

The quotation by Edmund Burke which surrounds the enlarged image of the African child (also chosen by the girls themselves) has a most remarkable appropriateness both for the manner in which the painting was done and of course for the entire Appeal itself; that is what it was all about.

# THE BAND

Three girls first seen with Howard in the great video THINGS CAN ONLY GET BETTER, then on stage with him for the Montreux performance of LIFE IN ONE DAY, and who've been touring with him now since the American leg of the DREAM INTO ACTION tour.

Naomi, Caron and Claudia first formed Afrodiziak in 1982 when they provided backing vocals for Genevieve on the track No Sob Story—and they've been either in the studio or on the road ever since, from Haysi Fantayzee, and The Jam (on their last No 1 single Beat Surrender and on their Final Act tour), to Elvis Costello and The Attractions, Madness, and many others. It was their vocals which highlighted Special AKA's Free Nelson Mandela song, and they've been heard and seen in various degrees of recognisability in jingles, film scores and videos as well as making a notable contribution on Starvation, a record released to raise funds for the African famine.

They are very lively, great fun to be with and have added much spectacle and interest musically and otherwise, offstage as well as on.

What bands have you played in? The Peddlers Quantum Jump David Essex Band Brian Ferry Elkie Brooks Rupert Hine
I also worked as a session musician for eight years doing different things – from London Symphony Orchestra to Tina Turner and Art Garfunkel

Where did you meet Howard? At the Farmyard Recording Studios when Howard was working on his first album.

Your drumkit is unconventional to say the least; can you briefly explain the principles of how it works:
The kit I play is a digital drum kit, made up of two SIMMONS SDS7 kits and a 'ddrum' system. All the sounds you hear (bass drum, snare etc.) are "real" and have been previously sampled and stored digitally in micro-chips. Then when I hit any particular pad it triggers the module holding those chips, which instantly plays back that original sound. The whole system is switchable, let he pad that is triggering the bass drum module can at the touch of a button be re-routed to a tom-tom module or any other one that I desire.

I also use two SIMMONS SDS1 pads each of which will go

also use two SIMMONS SDS1 pads each of which will go up or down an octave if a roll is played on them.














What's it like being in a band with your brother?

Apart from the sheer physical and mental agony it's really quite good. Howard and I get on very well. We like to beat each other up frequently (usually after a concert). I think it's good for keeping his huge ego at bay. But seriously, Howard is a great lad. He has tremendous energy and is very easy to get on with in a band situation.

As the guitar is your main instrument, why did you change to the bass?
I still do play the guitar when I get the chance. I started playing the bass just out of fun really because I felt I was stagnating on guitar and it just grew from there. I still feel I am learning of course – a process one never ever stops doing!

What other jobs have you done?
I have done about four other main jobs apart from being a musician. I used to work in a plastics factory cutting and shaping polarized plastic. Then I was a postman for a short while which was great fun apart from the dogs. I also worked as a warehousman at a catalogue showroom firm which was pretty hard work, and then I had my own business selling wholefoods on a market stall which was a lot of fun.










# **Dear Everyone**



I just read that you are a vegetarian, so I know you can understand my problem.




My mother gripes because I don't eat what the rest of the family eats. What can I say to make them understand? I am annoyed.

"I'm glad you are a veggy. Try not get mad with your friend if you can. Use the opportunity to carefully explain how you can easily eat and live (in a very healthy way) without participating in the conspiracy of killing animals. As for your mother, who the hell does she think she is trying to make you into a killer when you are not?? She should be proud of your principles and the strength you have to carry out what you believe.

Understanding is primarily conveyed by patience, reason, and mainly being what you say you are."





I certainly hope that your philosophy ("Things can only get better") works. My own depression lately is over the world's and my own racial problems. Through all of this insanity I appreciate your optimism. I have no idea how you stand on this issue, but I thought I would give it a try. I am black and being black presents problems for me.

It makes me extremely uncomfortable to talk about anything that has to do with race. I consider myself color**blind** – the problem is many people around me, including some of my family, are far from it.

I am persecuted by some of my fellow blacks because of my musical and hero preferences. I don't "sound" black according to some of them. Since I go to a private school, plus everything else, I am called an

And to make matters worse, there seems to be a resurgence of the Neo-Nazi party and no one seems to be paying it any attention. Everyone that I talk to about it thinks that I am paranoid or "freaking-out"

Only a few people (two) seem to understand where Is am coming from. I had a good cry over this. It made me feel much better, but no matter how much I cry things


remain the same. I know that crying won't do anything but help relieve the tension in my body. I hope that

things won't get any worse.
You don't have to act in a certain way to be any color. Color is such an irrelevant thing. It's not even skin deep. I guess that all that can be done now is not to think about it. If not, what is the solution to my problem? Howard can you help?

"One of the issues that makes me both sad and angry today is that of racialism. I can hardly believe that in 1985 it still exists. It seems that you experience the effects of it and the backlash effect from your black friends. The only way these ignorances are to be cured is in a long and exists the first it with its like. only way these ignorances are to be cured is in a long and painstaking way. That is to fight it with intelligence, reason and boycotting of offending persons. Bigotry is a form of fear and paranoia. The bigots pay in the long run but the process would speed up if everyone of us took on the responsibility of refusing to let the odd racist remark pass the lips of a person without at least a cold shoulder and silent (or not so silent) rebuke.

How long does this crap have to go on for (the Mr Anary side of me things) – well as long as we

Angry side of me things) – well as long as we (collectively) let it. Fight the bigot not with the fist or gun but the cold shoulder and boycott.







The shallowness of some (most) people really bugs me. Most teens around where I live only talk about clothes and other people – not nice things mind you! I finally found a group of people who can talk about the things that matter: we can get into discussions about suicide, the world situation etc. We still have a good time but we can talk about important subjects. Why do people insist on being so shallow? Then those same people try to shove their morals down our throats. After they talk about people, they yell at us for talking about people! people!

I have found that there aren't many people you can trust in this world, and when you find some that you can, stick with 'em I say, and to hell with the others. What do you think?"

"I don't like shallowness either but I think I hate cliqueness even more. You can't just say to hell with everyone just because they don't think like you – even if you're right. At this rate you'll be a cynic before you're out of your teens!! I prefer to have faith in human nature; there is good in everyone, and anyway we are not responsible for the way we have turned out. I admire your pursuit of "important" subjects – share it with everyone."

At school there are 10 boys who constantly bug, tease and torment me. I have done nothing at all – they just pulled me out of the crowd. It has been going on now for two years. I have asked my friends, parents, counsellors etc. but alas, nothing has helped.

I appeal to you HELP!
PS Please don't print my name, just put 'in need'."

"People who bug, tease, torment etc. can only do so as long as you react to them. Don't REACT! Let the poor infants make fools of themselves – but how can it touch you: you are streets ahead. This isn't easy I know, but surely you can do it."





Hi! My problem is not your average 16 year-olds problem. My problem starts off with my mom. She is gay, and she has been all my

When the local newspaper published an article about my mom and her problem with the city, it said her name – and the word lesbian came soon after it.

Since then I have been getting a lot of black at school. I thought things would be better if I owned up to it. of bigotry." of bigotry.







I have noticed a lot of the Ethiopian famine lately and it really does get to me. When I see those shows they put on the air, they really make me cry. I really want to help but I am only 14 and I don't have any money. Whenever I ask my parents they always seem to say "The Company donates money". I want to see it working: What can I do?

"If you haven't any money and you can't go to Ethiopia yourself, there is something that you and we can all do to help. I have often wondered at the possible effect of hundreds and thousands of people concentrating their thoughts on a positive feeling towards people in real trouble. 



# VEGETABLE LAYER (serves four)

# **INGREDIENTS**

1 lb potatoes
½ cauliflower
8 oz carrots
2 oz műshrooms
4 oz green beans

4 of green bed 4 oz cheese 2 eggs salt & pepper (peeled and sliced)

(broken into florets)

(sliced, frozen or fresh) (English Cheddar, grated) ½ pt milk

# METHOD

- Place layers of potatoes, eauliflower, carrots, mushrooms, beans and cheese in a buttered oven-proof dish. Repeat until all these ingredients are used, finishing with a layer of cheese.
- Beat together the eggs, milk, salt and pepper, and pour over the vegetables.
- 3. Bake gas mark 4 (180 deg C/350 deg F) for 90 mins or until set and golden brown.

I was positioned near the mixing desks, and I was fully aware of the problems being coped with so admirably by Mike (sound) and Nick (lights), because the rain and wind were blowing in under the covers and making it difficult and wet for everyone

The fans joined in the singing of the songs and the music and voices rose through the dark night air, lifting me to such an extent that I had a lump in my throat. To me a stranger in New York it really was omoving to see and hear the reception accorded to Howard – the same wonderful reaction in New York


as I had seen being given to him back home all those miles away in London, and that made me realise as never before just how much Howard is appreciated and loved by thousands – tens no, hundreds of thousands of people all over the world. And that is just wonderful. I shall always remember Pier 84 and 28 June 1985..."


# And then, two nights later to Jones Beach, Long Island ...

Somehow I felt very humble and yet very proud to have been given the opportunity not only to enjoy but to witness the great performance that Howard always gives, and how much it had been enjoyed and appreciated by all those fans who cheered and screamed their hearts out to someone they admire so much – and it must be said this includes Jan and all the crew, who work so hard and do such a great job. I am full of admiration for all and everyone of them, but most of all for Howard and Jan who have made all this possible."
